Dear Friends,

For they drank from the spiritual rock that followed them, and the rock was Christ (1 Corinthians 10:4b).



Dear Friends,

In chapter 10 of 1 Corinthians, St. Paul reminds the Christians in Corinth of part of the foundational story of the Jewish people: the story of Israel's forty years in the wilderness between their exodus from Egypt and their arrival in the Promised Land of Canaan. The Old Testament stories of the wilderness wanderings recount two occasions (Exodus chapter 17 and Numbers chapter 20), when Moses strikes a rock, which then produces water to quench the thirst of this desert people. In 1 Corinthians, Paul sees in the rock from which water came the presence of Christ himself with the Israelites, watching over them and providing for their needs as they navigated the harsh and unforgiving wilderness landscape. I imagine that Paul sees in the rock the presence of Christ because, like Christ, rocks are solid and provide security and firm foundation, and because Christ offers to us the true living water of life.

For my family, 2025 has not turned out as we had expected it might. We have endured our own period in the wilderness. As many of you will know, two days after Christmas last year, I was


rushed by emergency ambulance to hospital, where I remained for a month, spending the majority of that time in Intensive Care. I had contracted double pneumonia, and was, for a time, critically ill. I spent twelve days in a medically induced coma, during which time I came close to losing my life on two occasions. As I was fighting for my life, my wife Charlotte had to continue to keep life at home as normal as possible for our children, aged 6 months and ten, living with the possibility that husband, dad and stepdad might not come home. These weeks were indeed wilderness times for our family, and, in unique ways, for each of us individually. Thankfully, thanks to much prayer and the outstanding care of the ICU team at Pinderfields Hospital, my condition began to improve. The road of recovery is long, bringing both joys and challenges to us all. It is wholly understandable that when wilderness times hit us, we can so often doubt the presence of God or his goodness. By God's grace, we did not find ourselves in that place, but rather in the place of knowing our need to surrender our selves lock, stock and barrel to the one who alone could lead us through the wilderness and be for us all that we needed. We needed a rock to uphold us and life-giving water to sustain us. We found it in Jesus.

None of this is to make light of how dark and hard those weeks at the beginning of this year were, nor of how dark wilderness times can be for any of us. I am well aware that so many people suffer appallingly in so many ways, and this is certainly not a glib 'just trust in God, because he will make sure everything is ok' kind of message I'm wanting to give here. I know, for example, that many people who are unfortunate enough to contract the same illness I did do not get better, but, rather, are taken by the illness. What I am saying is that, in every circumstance, not matter how dark and devoid of hope it may seem, Christ, the rock that gives security and living water, is with us. He will be for us all that we need in every circumstance. I testify out of my own experience and that of my family.

I carry with me a permanent, physical reminder of our time in the wilderness. At the base of my neck is a scar, marking he place where a tracheostomy was fitted. You may well not see it, especially if I am wearing my dog collar. I see it every day. It is a reminder of our dark wilderness days. However, more than that, it is a reminder that, though we walked through the valley of the shadow of death, Christ walked with us and led us through; that he was for us a rock who protected and sustained us. It reminds me that whatever it is that we may face in this life, however harsh and unforgiving the wilderness, we can always drink from the spiritual

rock that follows us, and the rock is Christ.

### Feast of the Assumption (August 15th)

Herbed Bread: In some regions, bread baked with herbs is prepared to celebrate the Assumption of Mary.

Tarta de Santiago: This almond cake from the region of Galicia in Spain is often associated with the Feast of the Assumption of Mary. It is traditionally dusted with powdered sugar and decorated with the cross of St. James.



### Recipe

- 4 eggs
- 200 g caster sugar
- 200 g almond flour (or ground almonds)
- Zest from 1 lemon
- 2.5 ml cinnamon
- 30 ml icing sugar

Preheat oven to 350F/180C. Line an 8 inch/20cm round springform/cake pan/tin with parchment on the bottom and rub the sides with a little butter.

Crack the eggs into a bowl and add the sugar. Whisk the two together until well combined and starting to become lighter in colour with a bit of air in the mixture.

Add the almond flour/ground almonds, lemon zest and cinnamon and mix until combined, but try not to overmix and get all of the air out of the mixture.

Pour the mixture into the prepared cake tin and place in the preheated oven. Bake for approximately 30 minutes until a skewer inserted in the middle comes out clean. Meanwhile, make the cross stencil, if not already prepared.

Remove the cake from the oven and allow to cool around 10-15 minutes on a cooling rack before removing the outer ring. Allow it to cool completely before placing the stencil on top of the middle then dusting some icing sugar over the top. Carefully remove the stencil without letting the sugar fall on the area you had covered. Slice and serve or store in a tin at room temp.

# Diocesan Internship Scheme applications open to all for 2025/26



Applications are open for our Diocesan Internship Scheme for 2025/26, and we want to encourage a whole range of people to apply.

The Leeds Diocesan Internship Scheme is an opportunity to explore more of what it means to be a lifelong disciple of Christ and to serve His church.

It is a year where people from all kinds of backgrounds are equipped for the kingdom of God in life, work, and leadership.

The scheme runs from September to July and involves practical placements in churches, weekly training, and being part of a Christian community of interns.

The Revd Simon Walters, Diocesan Intern Lead, said: "I'd really like to encourage you to know that God is calling a whole diverse range of different people to be interns. "Classically we think of interns as maybe university graduates in their early 20s who have just finished and have some free time. But in fact, there's a whole bunch of other people whom God is calling."

"We have people who've encountered the presence of God and whose response is to say, 'I want to know more about him.' We have people at particular transition points in their lives trying to work out what it is for them to use their gifts in serving the church."

"I'm so passionate about internships because I was an intern myself 12 years ago. A church took a chance on me, and it was an investment, I think, in the church of the future."

"Are there people in my church community who might not look like your typical intern, but whom this could be a good thing?" The arrival of a new Pope is a joyful moment for Christians, says Bishop Nick



The Rt Revd Nick Baines has described the election of the new Pope as a joyful occasion for all Christians.

"The election of Pope Leo XIV is a cause for great joy among all Christians," said Bishop Nick.

# The Church bursting into life

Sunday, June 8, from midday until 2.30pm, in Bradford's Bowling Park will witness a "Pentecost Party" featuring some of the diversity of the Area's churches and Christians. It will take place in "The Beacon", a touring venue which is part of the 2025 UK City of Culture Programme.

In an echo of the first
Pentecost, at which people
were heard praising God in
languages from around the
world, the Party in Bowling
Park will bring together
singing, testimonies, stories
and prayer from, among
other places, Nepal, Ghana,
Sudan, the Democratic
Republic of the Congo and
Iran.

There is an awful lot of babble around these days, not least coming out of our smartphones. Much of that babble is divisive and ugly, insulting and seeking to set people against one another. We've seen how this babble can infect community relations, sour our political discourse and how it even encourages violence on our streets.



The church that burst into life that first Pentecost, at which three thousand people were added to the number of disciples in a single day, instead brought people together. Women and men, slaves and free people, poor and rich, Jews and non-Jews, educated Greek-speakers and 'barbarians.' They all met to praise God, to share food together and with the wealthy supporting those who were struggling. A love for Jesus was almost everything that they had in common.

This is our story and our inheritance. Especially when sometimes even the church itself can feel infected by divisive babble on social media, it's good to be reminded of the Person and the story that brings us together, whether in Bowling Park or any of the multitude of churches that are celebrating Pentecost this year across our wonderful and varied diocese.

### Ofsted inspectors praise one of our primary schools for its community role

One of our Bradford primary schools in Bradford has been praised by Ofsted inspectors for being "at the very heart of its local community".

St Paul's CE Primary School, Wibsey, was visited in March and a newly-released report said the school has "taken effective action to maintain the standards" which were identified during its last check, when it was rated 'good' overall.

Headteacher Sean Helliwell-Kenny said: "I am extremely proud and very fortunate to be the headteacher of such an amazing school where the children, staff and parents work together to provide the very best education and experiences that all children deserve.

"We're pleased that the Ofsted inspectors were able to see that the children and adults of St Paul's live out the school values every day and so naturally.

"We are equally as proud of our close links to St Paul's church and the outreach work we take part in within the local community."



### New hostel for walkers and cyclists opens in a former church



St Michael's Lodge in Hudswell, near Richmond is opening its doors as a new hostel for walkers and cyclists on Saturday.

Over the last 18 months, villagers and local tradespeople have worked hard to restore and repurpose their former parish church as a hostel for walkers and cyclists and the Rt Revd Anna Eltringham, Bishop of Ripon stopped off on pilgrimage walk to see work in progress.

Hudswell Community Charity acquired the redundant church from the Church Commissioners in 2023.

Since then they have raised almost £900,000 in grant aid to pay for the conversion work.

The result has seen all the historic features of the building retained, while providing modern accommodation with six ensuite rooms, a resident's lounge and dining area in the former chancel and kitchen in the former vestry.

Annie Sumner, one of the Charity Trustees, explained that "We were very keen that when guests entered the building from the porch, they would be able to see right through to large East Window and up to the wooden ceiling, so the open design and the use of a lot of glass has enabled us to achieve this."

Martin Booth, another trustee added "We wanted to preserve our parish church and keep it accessible and in the ownership of the local community.

"To achieve this, we needed to give it a new use that would generate an income so that we could maintain the building and we also wanted it to be an asset to the village that would support our other community owned businesses - the George and Dragon pub and the Little Shop. We are sure that St Michael's Lodge will fulfil this dream."



### Leeds vicar to swim the Channel for charity - in his local pool



Revd Phil Arnold, vicar of Christ Church Upper Armley, will swim the 21 miles of the English Channel, in his local pool in aid of vital church building improvements.

He will swim 5 hours every day for five days consecutively and said: "I approached the Armey Leisure Centre manager, Dean McKenna nine months ago and he agreed to make it happen.

The centre has a brilliant pool, I really enjoy swimming there and it's a hub for healthy living in the Armley community and beyond."

Revd Phil asked for a bit of coaching and was linked with swimming teacher Lucy Miller, and her dad Alan Miller, a top coach who worked with swimmers at the City of Leeds Swimming club at the International Pool and the John Charles Aquatic Centre.

"Suffice to say, I haven't lived up to those lofty heights, but it's been a rewarding journey," said Revd Phil.

The swim is to raise money from the Armley Good Neighbours Project, that seeks to future-proof Christ Church by making improvements to the building with a target of £300,000.

### **Days Out**

#### A visit to Worcester Cathedral

Worcester is a cathedral city. The River Severn flanks the western side of the city centre, overlooked by Worcester Cathedral. Worcester is the home of Royal Worcester Porcelain, Lea & Perrins (makers of traditional Worcestershire sauce) and Berrow's Worcester Journal, claimed as the world's oldest newspaper. The composer Edward Elgar (1857-1934) grew up in the city.

Worcester is a city in central England's West Midlands region. By the River Severn, the medieval Worcester Cathedral houses royal tombs, a crypt and cloisters. At The Commandery, a museum traces the building's evolution from the Middle Ages through England's Civil War to the 1950s. The timber-framed Tudor House Museum focuses on life in Tudor and 17th-century Worcester, with displays on traditional brewing and weaving.

The Battle of Worcester in 1651 was the final battle of the English

Civil War, during which Oliver Cromwell's New Model Army defeated King Charles

II's Royalists.



Worcester Cathedral has been a place of worship for fourteen centuries and is dedicated to Christ and the Blessed Virgin Mary. It has been described as possibly the most interesting of all England's cathedrals, especially architecturally. The first cathedral was founded in 680. Saint Oswald then built another cathedral in 983 and established a monastery attached to it. Saint Wulstan began the present building in 1084, replacing the earlier cathedrals.

During Anglo-Saxon times, Worcester was one of the most important monastic cathedrals in the country. It was a great centre of learning, which continued into the later Middle Ages, when Worcester's Benedictine monks went to university to study theology, medicine, law, history, mathematics, physics and astronomy. Some of the medieval university textbooks still survive in the Cathedral Library today.

King John (1166-1216) the so called 'bad' King John, villain of every good Robin Hood story and famous for sealing Magna Carta, died aged 46 years at Newark Castle, Nottinghamshire. He was buried, at his own request, in Worcester Cathedral and his tomb can be seen near the altar.



The monastery continued until the dissolution by King Henry VIII. The Cathedral was badly damaged in the Civil Wars, and as a consequence a major programme of rebuilding was needed after the Restoration of Charles II. The Victorians carried out the largest restoration from 1854-75.

Worcester has a famous musical tradition. Sir Edward Elgar

performed in the Cathedral many times in the famous Three Choirs Festival, an annual choral event which is rotated between the cathedrals of Gloucester, Hereford, and Worcester.





Worcester Cathedral is a beautiful building, steeped in history. Overlooking the River Severn, it is lovely to take a short walk around the back of the Cathedral and sit watching the swans and other wildlife on the river. It is so tranquil.

### St Swithun (St Swithun's Day, 15 July)

Saint Swithun was a bishop in Saxon times. He was born in 800 AD in Wessex, the South West of England. He was famous for giving gifts to others and for building churches. He is also known for building a stone bridge over the River Itchen in Winchester, to help the poor cross the river to sell their wares in the city.



Linked to this is the only known miracle during his lifetime. A woman was crossing a bridge when she dropped her basket of eggs, breaking them all. Her crying was said to be heard by St Swithun who immediately repaired the eggs!

### His life and death

He was made Bishop of Winchester in 852 AD. Saint Swithun died on July 2<sup>nd</sup> 862 AD. Legend has it that when he lay on his deathbed, he asked to be buried just outside of the Old Minster where he would be walked on and rained on.

Nine years later, on July 15<sup>th</sup> 871 AD, his body was moved to a shrine inside the cathedral. According to legend, there was a heavy rainstorm on this night which lasted for 40 days and 40 nights. People believe the storms indicated Saint Swithin's annoyance at being moved.

### St Swithun's Day – 15<sup>th</sup> July

St. Swithun's Day is marked on the day that his body was moved. It is believed that if it rains on this day, it will rain for the next 40 days and if it is dry, it will be followed by 40 days of fine weather.

St. Swithun's Day Rhyme:
St. Swithun's day if thou dost rain,
For forty days it will remain,
St. Swithun's day if thou be fair,
For forty days 'twill rain nae mair.

Thankfully, according to the Met Office, there is no record of 40 dry or 40 wet days following St. Swithun's Day since records began in 1861.
