Connected to God

The Gospel of John, helps us understand that the idea of abiding doesn't require us to do something, but it does require us to live the abundant truth of who God says we are in Christ. So we look at John 15:1-4; 7-8.



Do you know what the Italian word "abbondanza" means? Can you guess? I see something like the word "dance" in it; what do you see? Before you grab your phone and type it into Google Translate, it means "abundance" in Italian. Don't you like how that word rolls off your tongue? As you say it: abbondanza, can you picture the lush vineyards in Italy (even if you've never been there)? Do you see a table laden with all kinds of grapes, cheese, wine, and delicious pasta dishes? That makes me think of the word "abundance". Jesus told his followers, that his goal for us is to bear fruit—the passage says, "bear more fruit." I believe this ties in with an earlier statement Jesus made about us having an abundant life (John 10:10). Do you feel like you're living an abundant life? I think we all go through difficult periods when we feel short on time, on money, on patience, on everything. If you are like me, you're wondering, "Where is this abundant life where I am bearing more fruit? How do I get there?" in the text John has two big ideas—"bearing fruit" and "abiding,"—and these ideas can help us understand what Jesus meant when he said we could have life more abundantly.

I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine grower. He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. (John 15:1-3 NRSV)

Jesus begins with a metaphor. The Father is the vineyard keeper, and Jesus is the vine. As we go on, there is some wordplay among the words for "prune" and "removes" in verse 2, and "cleansed" in verse 3. The root verb for both prune and remove is the same and is related to the word used for clean/cleansed. The idea of pruning/removing doesn't mean God kicks anybody out. It means "making clean." The same word used for "clean" appears in John 13:10-11 at the Last Supper, where Jesus says to the disciples that "not all of you are clean." In verse 3, Jesus says that the disciples (and believers like us)

are already cleansed, and the idea in verse 2 is that God the vineyard keeper continues cleansing us by his love with the goal of making us stronger and more fruitful.

Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. (John 15:4 NRSV)

Jesus says to abide in him as he abides in us. Too often we interpret this as something we have to do, rather than thinking of it as something we are. We know that we are completely forgiven, loved, accepted, and included in the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit relationship because of Jesus—the way he lived a life of love and complete connection to the Father even when humanity's hate demanded that he die. And he did it, so that hate and death would be put to death once and for all. What if abiding in Jesus means living in who we are in God—completely forgiven, loved, accepted, and included? He abides in us, so there's nothing we need to do to get him to abide in us more, other than abide in knowing that we are who he says we are. We live knowing that he is with us, and we are with him. This enables us to bear much fruit, this leads to a life that is abundant.

If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples. (John 15:7-8 NRSV)

As we rest in the truth of who we are, our prayers become different. They become more in tune with what God is doing in a particular situation. Jesus himself prayed in the garden, "yet not what I want but what you want" (Matt. 26:39, NRSV). As we get used to being confident of who we are in Christ, and that God loves us so much that

he sent Christ to die for us even when we were his enemies, the way we live and pray aligns with that truth, and as this happens, we "bear much fruit." Abundant life comes from embracing the truth of who we are in Jesus Christ.

Rogation Sunday is 5th May 2024.

Rogation is an ancient church festival to seek blessing for a community and its sustenance. The word rogation comes from the Latin verb rogare, meaning "to ask", which reflects the beseeching of God for protection from calamities. The Major Rogation (from Latin rogare, "to ask [for God's blessings and



mercy]") originated as a Christian festival to replace a pagan Roman festival, Robigalia, which consisted of a procession from Rome to a point outside the city, where a dog and a sheep were sacrificed to save the crops from blight.

Psalm 50:1-2, 10-11

the city perfect in its beauty. and the cattle on thousands of hills. and all living things in the fields. our hills and streams our rivers, lakes, reservoirs and seas that in all these things we might glimpse a reflection of your glory and your gracious love for each one of us.

Rogation is a time of asking, asking God's blessings on emerging crops. In times gone by when everything depended on the local harvest, this was vital. A failed local harvest meant starvation, so asking God's Blessing at various points was seen as important. We still depend on farming today for our food but can draw on harvest from all over the country and beyond. It can be easy to feel disconnected form where our food comes from. Which makes this is still a good time to pray for farmers who are at the mercy of the weather. The pandemic reminded us that farmers are key workers and need our support.

This is also a good time to ask God's blessing on our communities many of whom have been hit hard by past events. Walking around our community and praying at various points is a positive way of supporting those communities. Giving thanks to God for the countryside and green spaces that help raise our spirits.

Rogation provides us with the opportunity to praise the Creator God, give thanks for our food and those who produce it; to pray a blessing on the communities in which we live and share together. Let us celebrate in thankfulness for all we have been given.





Diocesan News April 2024



Bishop Tony to retire this summer after 42 years service



The Rt Revd Tony Robinson, Bishop of Wakefield, will retire this summer after 42 years of ordained ministry.

On December 6, 2002 he was consecrated as Bishop of Pontefract in York Minster by the then Archbishop of York, David Hope and after the creation of the Diocese of Leeds in 2014, he became its first Bishop of Wakefield in 2015.

"Having spent nearly two thirds of my 42 years of ordained ministry here in Wakefield the time has come to retire. Sue and I have loved living in Yorkshire and it has been a great joy to share in the lives of countless people, clergy, parishes and communities," said Bishop Tony.

"The creation of the Diocese of Leeds was something that I couldn't have imagined back in 1997, but it was worth all the incredible upheaval and adjustment under Bishop Nick's leadership so that is ready to face the challenges facing the Church of England today."

In tribute to Bishop Tony's faithful work for the church and communities, the Rt Revd Nick Baines, Bishop of Leeds said: "I first worked with Bishop Tony in the Diocese of Leicester from 1991 where we were both incumbents and then area deans. It was a privilege to serve with him then and, later, to follow him to West Yorkshire.

"He could not have been a better episcopal colleague during a time of change, challenge and opportunity. I will miss his calm, steady commitment to our diocesan ministry and mission. I am indebted personally to him for his constant support and encouragement.

"This diocese will lose a dedicated pastor, wise counsellor and exemplary bishop. In wishing him and Sue a long and happy retirement, they go with our love, gratitude, prayers and blessing."

Synod affirms our commitment to God's Creation and His people



Affirming our commitment to God's Creation and the people in it were the topics of the most recent Diocesan Synod.

The Bishop of Leeds, the Rt Revd Nick Baines, gave his Presidential Address, saying that in a world where news reports swing violently between troubling subjects, Christians must engage hopefully with reality, not turn away.

The Rt Revd Anna Eltringham, Bishop of Ripon, proposed a motion confirming our diocesan commitment to not invest in companies with significant revenues arising from fossil fuels, which passed with an overwhelming majority.

The Very Revd Andy Bowerman, Dean of Bradford, gave a presentation on his recent report which recommends the establishment of a new oversight groups for our overseas links, to champion them more effectively and allow for across links connections.

Christian defiance brings hope

Bishop Nick

There was once a very popular Easter song or hymn, but it actually got sung throughout the year, and one line confidently proclaimed about Jesus, 'back to life He came.'

No, he didn't! What happened to Jesus was resurrection, not resuscitation. The Christian can be confident because, as Paul puts it, God raised Christ from the dead. He didn't simply get his breath back after a long pause.

Now this matters. As John Wesley made clear, if we sing bad theology, then we will believe bad theology. So we must be clear what we are singing, what we are proclaiming, and therefore what we are believing. Now, I think this is very encouraging. We live in a world in which the film industry and the military political complex tell us that violence and destruction are the real powers. Death is final and to be avoided at all costs.

But Jesus took a different view. On the cross, he looked death, violence and destruction right in the eye. And he defied them. He exposed the sham and disempowered what looked to be invincible.



No wonder the early Christians were mocked for their apparent weirdness. A slain lamb sitting on the Emperor's throne at the heart of the Roman Empire?

But this is what defiant Christianity says. As the previously hopeless Peter, the friend who deserted Jesus at the crucial point of his suffering, now preaches in the streets, God raised this dead Jesus and the world is changed forever. It's in Acts chapter ten verses 39 to 40. Now there are many times in life when we feel defeated. It seems as if the power of death or violence or loss simply can't be overcome.

It can hit us when we least expect it. Like the first disciples of Jesus, we can find that the God who raised Christ from the dead is the same God who promises never to leave us or forsake us. So like the first friends of Jesus, we might wake up on Easter Day bewildered and confused. Less, "Christ is risen, Hallelujah!" And more, "you've got to be joking." But the last laugh and the last word belong to this God who defies even death with hope.

Bishop Smitha marks International Women's Day at special regional event

The Rt Revd Smitha Prasadam, Bishop of Huddersfield, attended a special International Women's Day event hosted by West Yorks Mayor, Tracey Brabin.

Women of West Yorkshire, was organised by the West Yorkshire Combined Authority and Bishop Smitha was there with Revd Canon Rachel Firth, Women's Advisor for the Huddersfield Episcopal Area and Kaneez Khan of Wellsprings Together.

They joined other prominent women from across the region for a day of celebration, education and inspiration.

Speaking after the event, Bishop Smitha highlighted the historic progress towards equality within the Church of England.

"In the year that Leeds Diocese celebrates its 10th anniversary, the CofE marks the 10th anniversary of women's ordination as bishops, and the 30th anniversary of women's ordination to the priesthood, I'm thrilled to be joining Bishop Anna who is Lead Bishop for women in the diocese, to celebrate these milestones in Bradford Cathedral on Saturday, May 4."



Charity founded on prayer receives King's Award for helping former prisoners



Alpha House, a charity which prepares people for mainstream society after prison and was born out of prayer has received the prestigious King's Award for Voluntary Service.

Concerned by the lack of housing and support for male prison leavers returning to Halifax and their social issues including drugs and alcohol dependency, former Probation Officer Fran Nowell decided to do something about it – with God's help and guidance.

Back in 2010, she began a project which now offers supported accommodation, help with mental health plus training and coaching to help residents turn their lives around, restore relationships and become productive members of society.

A worshipper at Christ Church, Mount Pellon, in our Huddersfield Episcopal Area, Fran had spent the last two decades of her 25 year career with the Probation Service in Calderdale and knew the hard road faced by former drug and alcohol addicts freshly released from jail.

"One night, I was praying and I heard God say: 'Do something about it' and I had the image in my mind of a large house with a garden – a real home offering wrap-around support," said Fran.

The project now has its own offices in Halifax centre, with enough space and facilities for groups of people to be helped with mental health issues, antiaddiction support and also gain access to literacy and numeracy coaching.

The first step is when they are collected from the prison gates by Alpha House staff and taken to a large house converted into seven individual flats.

The men are chaperoned while living in that building and when ready to move on, they go to a block of 18 flats next door.

From then, they start volunteering or going to college and become ready to move on to independent living and get own place.

Fran said: "Receiving the King's Award was a massive encouragement for the residents who were told that the whole project wouldn't work if it wasn't for their personal bravery and commitment.

"It really built them up and was also wonderful for the staff, volunteers and me."



Bishop Toby visits new ecumenical coffee shop mission

St. Mary's Church in Wyke were very excited to welcome the Bishop of Bradford, the Rt Revd Toby Howarth, to their newest ecumenical mission project.

Together with the Moravian, URC, Methodist, catholic and free churches locally, the church has opened The Meeting Place, a coffee shop in the village centre.

The Meeting Place offers a warm space and welcome to all who might be seeking friendship and pastoral care, along with an advice centre, meeting people's other needs in a variety of ways.

The Revd Lucy Wormsley, Vicar of St. Mary's, said: "The Meeting Place has been a new opportunity for the Church to meet people's needs whilst also offering the love of God to new people."

Bishop Toby said: "This project is a much needed provision for the people in this area, and it is great to see the churches working so closely together ecumenically."

The Calling

Have you been called or did you call yourself? Well, I think either is okay with God who created us and knows us intimately. Remember the excitement you felt when you think you're called by God to his mission. The excitement of talking to your vicar, making several visits to the DDO and eventually attending BAP and afterwards receiving that important call from the Bishop telling you the good news... Well, where are you now in your calling?

The burning question is: if we are so sure of our calling at the beginning, why then are we sometimes acting like those without faith and trust in God? We are very quick to give up and feel powerless as if we are in control of everything in the first place. We are not in control, God is. He is the one who called us into his mission.

We are called to embrace everything that is beautiful, peaceful and loving and not to run away from putting right everything that is ugly, destructive and hateful no matter how hard it is.



After all, Christ, who we follow, made himself powerless, suffered humiliation, torture and death on the cross all because of His love for us. He could have forced us to submission instead.

We recognise the love of God in the joy we feel when we are in contact with all that is pure and beautiful, but fail to recognise that adversity is the wound of contact with God when it is painful and sorrowful.

We experience the will of God's nurturing pressure on us when it is necessary for us to experience it. And to the extent that we are obedient to his will he rewards us with the knowledge of his faithfulness and love for us.

Now that you're faced with the reality of who you are and who you're called to be, wake up from your slumber, ignite that passion you felt at the beginning and let it burn by the power of the Holy Spirit which is in all of us. Amen.
