#### **Remembrance Sunday**

These famous lines are often spoken at Remembrance Sunday services, at funerals for the armed forces and other memorial services, including often as part of the Last Post ceremony at the Menin Gate.

They went with songs to the battle, they were young, Straight of limb, true of eye, steady and aglow. They were staunch to the end against odds uncounted; They fell with their faces to the foe.

#### They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them.

The British Legion was formed on 15 May 1921, bringing together four national organisations of ex-Servicemen that had established themselves after the First World War: The National Association of Discharged Sailors and Soldiers, The British National Federation of Discharged and Demobilized Sailors and Soldiers, The Comrades of The Great War, The Officers' Association.

By 1921, the tradition of a Two Minute Silence had been established.

The first ever Poppy Appeal was also held that year. The poppies sold out almost immediately and raised over £106,000; a

considerable amount at the time. This money was used to help WW1 veterans with employment and housing.

The Royal British Legion is here to help members of the Royal Navy, British Army, Royal Air Force, veterans and their families. We support serving and ex-serving personnel all year round, every day of the week.

Their support starts after one day of service and continues through life, long after service is over.

Please give generously when you see a poppy seller this year to enable this good work to continue.

# Cut arms supply to Sudan and restore diplomatic presence, urges Bishop Nick



Arms supplies to Sudan must be severed and British diplomatic presence in the war torn country be restored, Bishop Nick told the House of Lords recently.

Violent conflict began in April 2023 when tensions between the Sudanese military and a rival paramilitary group, the Rapid Support Forces, erupted into warfare that has displaced millions of people.

During a House of Lords debate, the Rt Revd Nick Baines, Bishop of Leeds: "The UK Government must, in my opinion, along with partners, leverage all its resources and political power to cut off the arms flow and create the conditions where any credible ceasefire might create the space for negotiation.

"Failure to address this catastrophe now will only lead to increasingly uncontrollable consequences elsewhere, further destabilisation of an already fragile region – an example, oil gelling in the pipelines will diminish South Sudan's economy and add to economic and humanitarian challenges – mass irregular migration will be a consequence and so on.

"So I agree with the call for all diplomatic means and one to add is it's essential that the new head of office, the new special envoy must physically get into Sudan.

"We need physical, visible presence, even if it's only on a regular visit. Other ambassadors and envoys are doing this."

Bishop Nick, who visited our Link diocese of Sudan together with the Rt Revd Toby Howarth, Bishop of Bradford earlier this year has previously warned that a "humanitarian crisis has exploded" in Sudan and that a generation of children are being "starved, made homeless, given no medical care or education."

#### Archdeacon Jonathan is moving to new flocks and pastures



The Ven Jonathan Gough is to retire from his role as Archdeacon of Richmond and Craven after five years of ministry in the Diocese of Leeds.

Archdeacon Jonathan will be leaving early in 2025 in a move aligned with his wife Revd Canon Dr Flora Winfield's recent appointment as the next Suffragan Bishop of Selby in the Diocese of York.

Speaking of his decision, Jonathan said: "It has been a huge privilege to serve as Archdeacon of Richmond and Craven since March 2019."

Wishing Archdeacon Jonathan all the best, the Rt Revd Nick Baines, Bishop of Leeds said: "We are very grateful for his service to the Ripon area and ministry in the diocese. We wish him and Flora the very best for the future – which promises to be bright and fulfilling."

#### For God so loved the world, and so must we

Remember those long summer days of June now already fading into a distant memory?

In the middle of that month, hundreds of local churches and people joined in with the annual Churches Count on Nature and Love your Burial Ground week, to celebrate and seek to protect the flora, fauna and wildlife found in our churchyards. The results are both sobering and joyous.

As well as noting 1460 different species, 50 less than the previous year, and what those were, such as mole, hedgehog, swollen-thighed beetle, oxeye daisy, herb robert and much, much more, a surprising 73% of those who registered for the initiative said inhabitants from outside the church community also joined in and took part.

When the church shows its care for creation, good stewardship and action against climate change, we witness to a God who made and loves all creatures. We also witness to a God who is relevant today with all the knocks and hurts this world and its people face, and can offer us a path of hope.

In the 5 marks of mission, 'safeguarding the integrity of creation' is at the bottom of the list. However in many ways it is integral to every other mark too.



When we care for creation we proclaim the good news of the Kingdom, gently evangelising about our creator God who sent his son to save us from our sin and who through his reconciling love invites us to join in with his redeeming work. Environmental action can also be a way in for new Christians who may already care passionately about the planet discover there are others in the church who do too, and bit by bit be nurtured in the relevance of the Christian faith more widely in their lives. Many today are also deeply anxious about our world, or affected personally by climate change such as the farmers on our doorstep whose livelihoods can be perilous as a result - so there are many near neighbours who need to know the pastoral care and release from worry Jesus can bring. Finally, the impact of climate change here and now on the poorest countries and communities cross our world is an urgent call to us all to strive for justice and peace.

Caring for God's earth, holds together our relationship with the Creator, creation and all God's creatures. If your church is yet to get involved, think about the nature count next year or starting your Eco Church journey which re-launches on the 8th October this year. For God so loved the world .... and so must we.

#### New year starts for our Mission Apprentices and Interns

The diocese has been pleased to welcome new interns and Mission Apprentices to join the existing cohort, as they begin their time of learning and service.

Our Mission Apprentices and Interns are serving in churches across the diocese.

This year, the group are gathering on Mondays at Fountains Church Bradford to work through a packed training programme, supported by the Revds Leah Leighton, Derek Jones and Amy Berry.

The term began looking at the subject of justice, through the lens of the Book of Amos.

Other topics this term include sin, the climate crisis, caring for God's people, trauma, hospitality, how to read the Bible and more.

The Archdeacon of Bradford, the Ven Dr Andy Jolley, said: "I'm thrilled that we have such a good and diverse cohort of Mission Apprentices and Interns serving and learning in churches this year."



#### Fountains Church Bradford share space and story with Bradford



Fountains Church Bradford have completed the final phase of their building project, and celebrated with an evening sharing their space and story with the city and district of Bradford.

Some 70 civic leaders, community representatives and other church leaders gathered in Fountains' newly completed upper auditorium on the evening of Thursday, September 26, where they heard of the vision of Fountains Church and the journey the team have been on to get to this point.

The Rt Revd Toby Howarth, the Bishop of Bradford, welcomed everyone to the event, and started by sharing how the journey of Fountains has begun, with prayer for a new church in the centre of the city, a prayer echoed by other churches and Bradford Cathedral.

Bishop Toby said: "I think of Bradford City Park as a smile, and it's so good to have fixed this 'broken tooth' in that smile.

"This journey has demanded an amazing amount of work, resilience, generosity and love, and I'm incredibly grateful to all who have made it happen, including people from all over the city and district and the Church Commissioners. "Our vision is to be a blessing to Bradford, showing, as we do from all our churches, the love of Jesus, and service to our communities."

After a short video sharing more of Fountains' journey, Bishop Toby joined with the Ven Dr Andy Jolley, Archdeacon of Bradford, and the Revd Linda Maslen, Vicar of Fountains, in a discussion of the project.

Revd Linda said: "I have found joy in thinking about what it means to worship God in Bradford, with its beautiful diversity.

"Our challenge has been working out how to reach out, meet and connect with all the different groups of people that make up our city and district.

"This building was used for so much darkness, so it is so encouraging that we can do this work to renew, restore and redeem it.

"Particularly during these challenging times, we want to work with everyone to offer support to all communities."

Archdeacon Andy said: "God has done way more in the last five years than I could have imagined, and I'm excited for the next five years, and what dreams might be fulfilled."



#### Bishop of Mara visits to recommit our link with Tanzania



The diocese was pleased to welcome recently the Rt Revd George Okoth, Bishop of Mara in Tanzania, and his wife Janet for a visit to explore and solidify our links with the region.

They arrived on Tuesday, September 24, and in the afternoon visited Christ Church Academy, Huddersfield.

On Wednesday, September 25, Bishop George and Janet visited St Stephen's West Bowling and their Shine Community Project, as well as Halifax Minster, where Bishop George presided at communion and shared a presentation about Mara.

In the evening there was a special service at Wakefield Cathedral to mark the links of our diocese with the Diocese of Mara.

On Friday, September 27, Bishop George and Janet went to St John's Rastrick for an event organised by the Mothers' Union.

#### Faith in the Park

Derek Twine CBE Chair of the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority

"The Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it." The Yorkshire Dales National Park is akin to Eden: wild animals and livestock, seeds and plant, trees and meadows, hills and streams. Generations before us have worked it: farmers, miners, weavers and more. It is a beautiful God-given landscape blessed with and amazing heritage and wonderful people.

Yet we face a worsening climate and wildlife crisis, dramatic degradation and loss of flora and fauna, and pollution of our water. And among our Dales communities we experience negative impacts from inequalities in transport, housing, education, access to communication and opportunities for young people. This is our challenging agenda.

As I became Chair of the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority, it's was a moment to accept and honour the commission that "God took the man ... to take care of it".

Our two statutory purposes as a National Park are to conserve and enhance the natural beauty, wildlife and cultural heritage, and to promote



opportunities for the public understanding of the Park's special qualities. The first of these is, in effect, to fulfil Genesis 1:15; the second is a commission for mission.

We look to treat all people with respect, whether they be residents or visitors, or in addressing how we deal with the impacts of tourism and leisure, whilst ensuring open access for all; or when reaching out to engage all communities. For a person of faith, all these things are shaped by that faith.

At an emotional level, being out in the Dales gives a sense of awe, both at the landscape and the heritage. It's wonderful to share that with people of different faiths, coming together in a place where we can walk and feel closer to our common creation. In the same way that experiencing the outdoors is recognised for its physical and mental health benefits, it's beneficial for our spiritual awareness and growth.

We have much to do to address the serious challenges of our time, but we do so with prayer, hope and faith.

#### Christ the King Sunday - 24 November 2024

Christ the King Sunday is celebrated on the last Sunday of Ordinary time, before the beginning of Advent that starts the new Church Year. As the last Sunday of the Christian Church Year, Christ the King Sunday is the climax and conclusion of the



Church's liturgical journey through the life of Christ and the Gospel message. Its purpose is to celebrate the coming reign of Christ as King of the Earth and his completion of the renewed creation that marks the fullness of the Kingdom of God. That hope is born from the entire life of Christ and his teachings that have been celebrated in the seasons of the Church Year during the past twelve months.

We have been on a journey the past twelve months as we have travelled through the Christian Church Year. We have followed in the steps of Jesus as he was birthed in a stable, as he walked the dusty hillsides of Galilee, opened blind eyes and made the lame to walk again, as he taught the multitudes and the disciples, as he was crucified, and rose again. We have celebrated the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, reflected on the mission of the Church, and what it means to be a disciple of the Christ. Today is the last Sunday of that journey for this year. The Sunday after Christ the King we begin celebrating Advent as we once again begin that journey to remind ourselves who we are and whose we are.

We do so, knowing that the Kingdom of God that Jesus brought is a present reality in our lives. And yet we also know that there is a future Kingdom over which God will reign in Christ, a Kingdom in which the world will once again fully reflect its creator. Today we celebrate Christ as past, present, and future King over all the earth, at the same time that we express our hope and our Faith in that coming Kingdom.

So on 24<sup>th</sup> November, the Sunday when we celebrate Christ the King, we will look back at this past year's journey with Jesus. But we are also looking forward to our journey this coming year, as we express each week our Faith in the transforming power of God at work in our world, and in our Church, and in our lives to restore all of creation to his purposes. 38

Three of our benefice churches have their Patronal Feast Days during November: St Martin, Womersley(11th), St Edmund King and Martyr, Kellington (20th), and St Andrew, Ferrybridge (30th).

**Saint Martin of Tours** was born in in Savaria, Pannonia in either the year 316 or 336 AD. That region is what is today the nation of Hungary. As a young soldier, Martin encountered a beggar in Amiens. The beggar was unclothed and it was very cold. Martin removed his cloak and with his sword, he cut it in half. He gave this half to the beggar and dressed himself in the remnant. That night, Martin had a vision in which Christ appeared to him. The vision spoke to him, "Martin, a mere catechumen has clothed me." A catechumen is one who is being instructed in the Christian faith. In the early centuries of Christianity, that was a long process of instruction - and Martin was deeply dedicated to it.

St Martin is patron of the poor, soldiers, conscientious objectors, tailors, and winemakers

**Edmund, King and Martyr** died 20 November 869, he was king of East Anglia from about 855 until his death.

Few historical facts about Edmund are known, as the kingdom of East Anglia was devastated by the Vikings, who destroyed any contemporary evidence of his reign. Edmund's death was mentioned in the *Anglo-Saxon Chronicle*, which relates that he was killed in 869 after the Great Heathen Army advanced into East Anglia. Medieval versions of Edmund's life and martyrdom differ as to whether he died in battle fighting the Great Heathen Army, or if he met his death after being captured and then refusing the Viking leaders' demand that he renounce Christ.

Edmund is the patron saint of pandemics as well as kings.

**Saint Andrew** is the disciple in the New Testament who introduced his brother, the Apostle Peter, to Jesus, the Messiah. Saint Andrew as patron saint of Scotland.

The story goes that Andrew, the Galilean fisherman who was singled out to be Christ's first disciple, preached the Gospel in the lands around the Black Sea and in Greece and was eventually crucified on an X-shaped cross in Patras.

As well as his role as the patron saint of Scotland, and several other countries, St Andrew is also the saint of fishmongers, gout, singers, sore throats, spinsters, maidens, old maids and women wishing to become mothers.
