Ferrybridge War Memorial

Maintenance work was carried on the Ferrybridge War Memorial over the weekend commencing Friday 20th September. The memorial is grade 2 listed, so the work was carried out by accredited conservationists CalibreConservation of Saxilby, Lincs.

Thanks to the efforts of our local representatives a grant of £1000 has been obtained from the Community Fund, with the balance met from the Knottingley War Memorial Fund.

A brief history

The inhabitants of the village of Ferrybridge decided to honour those drawn from the community and slain in the Great War. To this end, a war memorial committee was formed with the aim of raising money to enable a suitable monument to be designed and erected.

The committee was under the chairmanship of Mr. E.L. Poulson, proprietor of the West Riding Pottery, Ferrybridge. A newspaper report in November 1920 revealed an ongoing series of fund- raising



events with the object of attaining the sum of £300 for a permanent memorial to the

"dear lads who gave their all in the great struggle for freedom."

The sum of £250 was eventually obtained by a combination of individual subscriptions and public events such as galas, concerts, whist drives etc., but there was still an outstanding sum of £100 at the time of the inauguration of the Memorial on Sunday 9th October 1921.

Designed and erected by E. Paver & Co., of Selby, the monument is an obelisk of Aberdeen granite some 6 feet in length standing on a rectangular base, making an overall height of 13' 6". On the face of the obelisk was carved a wreath and a sword and on the base in letters of lead were the words

"Lest We Forget"

above which in raised granite figures was the date "1914 – 1918". The die of the obelisk provided the space containing the names of the 38 servicemen who had forfeited their lives in the war.

In beautiful weather a large concourse assembled at the site near the foot of the Aire bridge, close to the junction of the new road to Castleford, to witness the unveiling and dedication of the Village Monument on Sunday 9th October 1921.

"It was a good car. Pity it was wrecked."



Church Buildings Grants scheme round 3 is open



The Diocese of Leeds is pleased to announce that the third round of our Church Buildings Grants scheme is now open.

Additional new funding is now available to help churches reach net zero carbon, increasing the capacity of the scheme to support churches in a variety of ways.

In order to support mission across the diocese, we launched our Church Buildings Grants scheme in 2021, which currently is providing £80,000 of grants per year for a minimum of five years.

The scheme now also allocates funds from two additional sources, the Church of England's Buildings for Mission fund, and their Net Zero Carbon Quick Wins fund.

Our Net Zero Carbon Quick Wins grants will be given to churches to support new energy, heating and lighting projects, including new insulation, solar panels, smart meters and more.

Fran Taylor, Diocesan Net Zero Carbon Fundraising Officer, said: "I am delighted that I am able to support churches in their own environmental projects, and the new Net Zero Carbon Quick Wins grants are a fantastic opportunity to kick start a huge variety of projects".

The Ven Dr Andy Jolley,
Archdeacon of Bradford, sits
on the panel that considers
grant applications, and said:
"I'm really delighted that we
can offer this kind of concrete
support to parishes across the
diocese, helping churches get
their buildings fit for the
future.

"The new Net Zero Carbon Quick Wins grants are a great addition to our existing scheme, allowing us to support an even greater range of projects than before."

The deadline for applications is Thursday, October 31.

Chinese church leaders meet and eat with Bishop Nick



Leaders from Chinese churches across the diocese met with the Rt Revd Nick Baines, Bishop of Leeds, to share about their mission in our region.

Bishop Nick invited the leaders from five churches in Leeds, Bradford and Huddersfield to a lunch to speak and eat together, to learn about the ministry of Chinese churches in our area and to discuss how the Diocese of Leeds can work together with Chinese churches.

The Revd Dave Ho Young represented St Barnabas' Alwoodley, which has a significant number of people from Hong Kong attending worship, and said: "The meeting between Bishop Nick and Chinese church leaders recognised the important role that Chinese churches have in the UK today."

21 hours on coach and ferry and a damp, cold arrival did not make for the most promising of beginnings for the pilgrimage, but, in the words of one person: "It turned ridiculous, but you find it from hell to fabulous, overnight."

Life in Taize is simple. Pilgrims fall into the rhythm of life of the Taize community with prayer 3 times a day, simple meals, a Bible introduction, the opportunity to reflect and discover with others what life in Christ can mean and to discern God's presence amid the challenges of everyday life.

We rejoiced in the Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell joining us for the weekend and presided at a glorious Eucharist in the village church and, in preaching at the



everyone that "however difficult, challenging or costly, life".

Among the joys of the week was connecting the Taize Prior, Matthew with his former neighbours in Pudsey and presenting him with a football shirt of his beloved Bradford City Football Club!

In the words of a pilgrim: "Worship, a bit challenging at first, at the start sitting in silence for 10 minutes seems easier and it has more meaning as you go along. It is amazing how many different ways there are to sing Alleluia. You don't have to be an amazing singer to join in, fortunately, everyone together sounds great. I have had a really pressured year studying for my A levels, waiting for results. Life is so different and so simple at Taize, you reset. It's worship, work and the people you are with. It is completely relaxing.

"I want to come again next year and would recommend it to others who haven't made the pilgrimage yet."

Grand days out thanks to charity support for a Leeds church community

Dozens of children and adults have enjoyed special summer days out, thanks to hard work by one of our Leeds churches and funding by a generous local charity.

St Agnes church serves the people of Burmantofts and Richmond Hill - the most deprived council ward in Leeds and members organised trips to Forbidden Corner, the popular family attraction near Middleham and to Bridlington for the seaside and fish and chips.

Organiser Gill Wigham told how thanks to the Leedsbased Wades Charity, everyone had great experiences without hurting their pockets.

Gill said: "At Forbidden Corner we had a picnic and we were blessed with dry weather."

"The cost of everything was provided thanks to Wade's Charity and that included coach travel, lunch, drinks, entry to the attraction and even the ice creams."



More than a quarter of parishes engage with Barnabas: Encouraging Confidence



More than 25 percent of our parishes have engaged with Barnabas: Encouraging Confidence since we were granted national funding just over a year ago.

Barnabas: Encouraging Confidence exists to offer support to every church to move forward in their mission in a way that is prayerful, intentional and with God's grace possible.

It offers one to one help (mentoring and coaching), places to learn from each other (learning communities is the term we use) and courses that aim to encourage confidence in line with our diocesan vision.

Personal Growth and Leadership is one such course. PG and L is homegrown, starting in Bradford but now available to many churches. Last year 16 churches and 65 individuals were able to take the course which works with teams of clergy and lay people from churches to grow in confidence.

Confident Leadership for Missional Church is now in its second year, with 19 individuals in the first cohort and 21 in the second.

The CPAS-designed course is a 10

month leadership development journey for clergy seeking to be equipped for new leadership challenges they will face.

In the Diocese of Leeds we also use mentoring in a variety of ways in order to support groups and individuals, to encourage those facing challenging circumstances.

35 mentors have been trained in the last year, offering encouragement, support, perspective, challenge, accountability and prayer to provide the mentee with a safe environment for exploring important issues.

Since last year we have begun several new Barnabas learning communities and trained their facilitators.

These communities cover topics including interim ministry, Messy Church, church grafting and planting, Growing Faith, Net Zero Buildings and more.

National report notes progress on racial justice in our diocese



A report on progress on racial justice in all 42 CofE dioceses has noted that in Leeds, this important work is "a whole diocese matter".

Progress on Racial Justice across the Church of England Dioceses from the Committee for Minority Ethnic Concerns (CMEAC), gives an account of how all 42 dioceses have responded to From Lament to Action FLTA) recommendations along with examples of good practice and case studies.

The review covers the work of the dioceses in promoting diversity and inclusion from support for UKME/GMH vocations, to racial justice charters, and work in partnership with local racial justice groups.

The new report's comments regarding the Diocese of Leeds included: "Racial justice is a 'whole diocese' matter. Since its formation in 2014, the Diocese has taken a number of steps to promote racial justice."
