
# 1st Knottingley Rainbows, Brownies and Guides



### A great day out in Scotland

### **Culzean Castle: A Majestic Jewel of Scotland's West Coast**

Nestled on the rugged cliffs of the Firth of Clyde in southwestern Scotland, Culzean Castle is a true testament to Scotland's rich history, architectural grandeur, and stunning natural beauty. # Public consultation about the next Bishop of Leeds launches

The Diocese of Leeds has launched its public consultation looking for the views of all people across our region about the next Bishop of Leeds.

We are asking for people to answer three questions about our new bishop and the future of our diocese, which are:

- What are your three hopes for the future of the church in your community?
- What three words describe the main skills and qualities the next Bishop of Leeds needs to have, to help us grow in confidence as a diocese?
- What is the one thing you want to say to the next Bishop of Leeds?

The Rt Revd Toby Howarth, Bishop of Bradford and the chair of our Vacancy in See committee, said: "This is a major moment for our diocese as we look forward with confidence to the next stage of our shared future.

"In doing so we would really like to hear what people think.

"Our prayer is these questions enable everyone in our diocese to have their say and to feel part of the process."

As part of the consultation process, we have produced postcards with the questions on them which are being sent to every church, which can be filled in by hand and are preaddressed to be posted back to Church House in Leeds.

Alongside these we have produced and are sending a poster advertising the consultation to every church, with a QR code to access the online form on it. Mission Apprentices and Interns celebrate serving churches and communities



Some 60 people gathered at Fountains Church on Tuesday, June 10, to celebrate and give thanks for our Bradford Mission Apprentices and Diocesan Interns, celebrating all that God has done in and through them during the time they have been serving their churches.

11 of our Mission Apprentices are approaching the end of their two year part-time role working in Resource or Resourcing Churches, or churches linked with them.

During this time, they have taken on responsibility for developing or growing areas of church life, ministry or mission in response to their particular gifts and sense of calling, and engaged with theological and practical learning through the Monday Learning Community.

The highlight of the evening was hearing from the interns and Mission Apprentices themselves about what they have been doing.

"Sing to the Lord a new song," says the psalmist. From well-known hymns to contemporary worship songs, each of us carries a song in our hearts to express the heights and depths of our lives, to give voice to and help articulate our praise and prayer.

In the modern era, our worship is often shaped not by the local but global. Whether choral or contemporary music is used, large publishing houses have become powerful forces to shape the style and sound of worship across continents. This is a far cry from the ancient world of Whitby, in which the 7th century cowherd Cædmon is believed to have written sacred songs for his community. With compositions deeply rooted in local traditions and musical styles, he's said to have engaged with the cultural rhythms of Yorkshire.

Drawing on this heritage of spiritual song that has seeped into our culture, can we now raise up our local musicians to craft music and lyrics that are suited to our northern dialect and reflect the spiritual needs of our local congregations? Can we encourage those who are gifted to write their own songs to draw authentically on our unique experiences and spiritual journeys? Locally written songs give voice to the specific joys, struggles, and stories of a congregation, making worship more meaningful and rooted in the realities of our shared life.



Writing local music also honours the incarnational nature of our Church where we see God at work in our people and place.

In Halifax and Calder Valley
Deanery, contemporary worship
musicians have come together
from different places to share
their songs with each other.
Some bring their own
compositions whilst others bring
songs which speak particularly
into their community.

Longing to connect the congregation with their spiritual roots here in Yorkshire, Robb & Ruth Sutherland have written a song about the Yorkshire Saints. It begins with the line "There's an ancient path, in Yorkshire's hills, marked with crosses of stone" and speaks of building God's kingdom here, as heroes like Hilda, Margaret and Paulinus once did.

One of the greatest charisms of our Church of England is a commitment to incarnational ministry through the local parish. As we faithfully declare that God became flesh and lived amongst us in the person of Jesus Christ, two millennia later, we form Christian communities that seek to live this reality each day. A living witness to God's grace and compassion which flows out through our worship, pastoral care and social outreach and responds directly to our local needs and culture.

### Cornerstone helps churches think about generosity and grow giving

Churches across the diocese have been able to take advantage of a new online learning platform to help them with their giving and generosity.

Cornerstone is a platform from the Church of England's Giving Team designed to support churches in all aspects of giving and generosity by using clear, step-by-step practical actions to grow giving and develop a deeper understanding of generosity.

Some 15 churches in the Harrogate deanery took part in our pilot for the Cornerstone platform in the autumn of 2024.

Following the workshop in October, the group from St Andrew's, Starbeck have worked through many pathways and have engaged the PCC in embedding generosity in the church.

The Revd Phil Carman, Vicar at St Andrew's, said: "One of the main learning points for us has been about how we communicate our impact and not just our need."
